## President's Message



It's the season of opportunity to reassess and renew, with Municipal voting throughout Ontario last month, mid-term elections in the United States this month, and our own Brooklin-Whitby Garden Club (BWGC) Annual General Meeting (AGM) on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of November. Board Executive and Directors will be voted into office for the 2023 season.

On the agenda for the AGM is a proposed Constitutional change, one that modifies the description of the term "meeting" to include on-line conferencing, either through a common conference video and audio sharing platform such as ZOOM or Webex, or by simple telephone conferencing. Full details of this proposed revision were mailed to you in early October.

As the demands from the gardens moderate this time of year, there are needs for help with Board responsibilities. It's time to develop the budget for 2023, and the yearbook and bookmarks for the first meeting in February. Planning will soon be underway for the 2024 season of speakers and their topics as 2023 is already set in place. The drive for our General Membership begins with the AGM, and our Corporate Support program has just begun.

This year, one of our goals is to take the documents and records we have collected over 101 years, and put them into a viable reference library archive, allowing simple reconstruction of our history for those interested in BWGC over the next 100 years.

Our Civic Beautification mandate for many years has begun with the Brooklin Horticultural Society Gardens, and now includes Park of Reflection and the Station Gallery. These locations bring forth the pleasure of gardening, including the satisfaction of enjoying the results, and the pleasure of doing so with others.

There is much to be done, to be managed, and to pursue going forward. We have so many opportunities we could execute, but it can't be done with just a few. This is your group, and the group needs you to participate, as you can and how you can. It could easily be the best garden club in Durham, with the most to offer for you, and with you!
