Hard to believe that gardening year 2012 is almost upon us. Unlike years past, our guest speakers this year do not fit any particular theme. Instead we are bringing you an eclectic line-up that is sure to inspire, bring lots of ideas, share gardening methods and how-tos, and appeal no matter your skill set. Something new though...Whitby In Bloom is co-sponsoring our speakers from March through to the end of June, allowing BHS to book some high demand garden experts normally outside our price range and WIB to attract a wider audience for their garden seminars - a win-win for both organizations. He will emphasize their diversity, versatility and especially their wow factor in the garden. STUDENT'S PROGRESS REPORT

What many members are not aware of is that I started at Niagara College this January as a full-time student in the Horticultural Technician Program. It is quite a challenge to return to school and to live so far away from my family and friends. Also to have to relearn so many skills that has been lost and forgotten, like formal Math and English. In Horticulture, so far we are learning to identify confers, how to manage green houses, plant science, and starting seedlings.
