## “Taming Wildflowers - From Seed to Vase!”

Long before ‘green’ or ‘sustainable’ became powerful buzzwords, **Miriam Goldberger** fell madly in love with the beauty and practicality that native plants bring to our lives.

A wildflower farmer since 1986, Miriam has seeded, planted, nurtured, harvested and created floral designs with thousands upon thousands of wildflowers.

Miriam will teach us to grow native wildflowers from seeds, design wildflower bouquets, and inspire us to grow flowers for our pollinator population. Her presentation will feature lush photos from her 100 acre

flower farm.

Miriam is a natural presenter who offers a unique body of knowledge to anyone interested in growing and enjoying wildflowers.

She is the founder and co-owner of Wildflower Farm, a wildflower seed production company. The farm produces wildflower and native grass seeds for gardens and meadows throughout North America.

She has culminated her 25 year love affair with wildflowers with her recently published book ‘*Taming Wildflowers*’. She will be available after the meeting to sign copies of her book which will be on sale.

He guided us through ways to increase the value of our property by investing in outdoor spaces such as stone patios, decks, walkways, landscaping and enhancing curb appeal. In April, **Marjorie Mason** spoke on 'Front Yard WOW'. Among her many tips were: 'growing gardens is a personal thing' and 'think of the front garden as being for your enjoyment, more so than for the neighbours'. A well attended and enjoyed presentation.

## Michael and Judi Denny Peony Garden



On June 10, one of our long time members is going to be recognized at a special event. On that day, the City of Oshawa will be holding a ceremony at which the **Oshawa Peony Gardens** will be renamed the **Michael and Judi Denny Peony Gardens**. Michael and Judi made these gardens happen.

In 2000, when the long established Wally Gilbert peony collection was being dismantled, Michael and Judi offered to take in the plants (planting hundreds of them on their property) and to ultimately find them a permanent home.

This collection became the basis of the present day

Oshawa Peony Gardens. In 2001, together with volunteers from various other groups, the Denny's moved one hundred peonies to their new home at the Oshawa Valley Botanical Gardens.

Further donations of peonies from breeders and suppliers from across North America led to the gardens flourishing into the largest contemporary collection on the continent. In addition, the Denny's donated from their own impressive collection. Today, there are more than 300 varieties in cultivation.

In 2005, Michael and Judi started the Oshawa Peony Show, an event dear to Judi's heart.

In summary, the Peony Gardens and Festival would not be what they are today without the dedicated efforts of Michael and Judi. It is only fitting that the Gardens are being renamed in their honour. Although it was May 6, the leaf buds were just plumping up while the Heptacodium (Seven Sons) was further along showing tiny emerging leaves. The London Plane Tree drew the most interest with the pruning students as **Faye Collins** showed off the beautiful camouflage-like pattern that occurs when the outer bark exfoliates to expose the creamy-coloured inner bark.

This year, the Commemorative Project team will continue to work on the following initiatives at the BHS Garden Park:

- ◆ Plant 2 or 3 more deciduous trees and 3 evergreens,
- ◆ Explore signage and additional benches with the Town of Whitby,
- ◆ Add plantings to attract butterflies and pollinators, and
- ◆ Inquire at local high schools about linking the volunteer needs of the students with the needs of the garden.

We invite you, along with your family and friends, to come check out our progress. The trees alone have much to offer as many have amazing blooms, some have exfoliating bark, while others have great fall colour. We look forward to seeing you there.
