When your mother is **Marjorie Mason** of

Mason House Gardens, you learn a lot about plants and gardening. Jeff teaches at George Brown College & TBG, consults in landscape design, and leads the occasional international garden tour, in addition to speaking at garden clubs, societies and Canada Blooms.

Jeff will be speaking to us about 'Helleborus', an evergreen flowering plant, also known as Lenten Rose. A great addition to any spring garden.

Speakers included Paul Laporte on The Role of Native Plants in the Life Cycle of Insects and Dale Leadbeater on The Challenges that are Faced by Native Species Today. Recent Speakers

On February 25, **Ken Brown** spoke on maximizing an urban garden landscape for a variety of vegetables including using garden structures for vertical tomato planting, and taking advantage of inter-planting species and using containers. The extensive Q&A session reflected Ken's ability to inspire and the universal appeal of vegetable gardening.

In March, **Frank Kershaw**, spoke about gardening with southern plants. With winter protection, many will thrive in our growing zone (same as Carolina and Cincinnati). Plants that can be grown include tulip tree, sweet chestnut, redbud, black gum, sassafras, Virginia creeper, Kentucky wisteria and Crocosmia Lucifer. A well-attended session.

In April, **Ken Brown** again entertained and informed us on the topic of garden design, when he filled in for **Vicki Taylor-Scott**. He showed us photos of England's Sissinghurst Gardens, the Japanese Garden in Portland Oregon, the Montreal Botanical Gardens and the evolution of his own gardens. Quotes include: 'Paths should draw you in and seduce you', 'Use what you have', and 'Mix things up'. Great presentation!
