A Stroll through the Garden...

The Brooklin Horticultural Society Garden that is and it is just now winding up it's seventh season in fine form, looking better than it ever has, a true representation of our membership of passionate gardeners. And if you haven't yet taken that stroll or come out to join us on Tuesday evenings, perhaps two new 2013 undertakings, one already a focal point, the other an enhancement to be enjoyed for years to come, will do the trick.

First is the **SUNDIAL** bed which from the time it was planted on the first two Tuesdays in June, has been a focal point. It is easily seen from the street and enjoyed and/or



commented on by everyone using the park. The Town of Whitby (with head gardener **Lori Kelm** taking the lead) provided the plant material, removed the existing shrubs and installed the actual dial. Our small but mighty band of volunteers designed, planted and kept it going. Amazingly it worked but did need almost weekly grooming so that the letters...Time Flies & BHS and the numbers: 8, 10, 12, 2, 4, done in green *alternanthera* remained legible and the *miniature marigold* clock hands stayed in line...not to mention replanting the blue *lobelia* that the resident rabbit family polished off more than once. And it continued to thrive well into October after other areas planted with perennials had ceased.

In fact it was used for "Night and Day Durham" 24Hours, October 18, a photo-journal documenting what was happening in our community every hour. At 8AM on that day, BHS members **Ken Brown, Eileen Humphries, Sherry Howard, Bill Hoogeveen and I** arrived ready to plant bulbs in the sundial bed. Among the still thriving annuals, we tucked clumps of tulips 'Margarita' and 'Gwen' and edged with countless crocus. It was chilly, it was damp, it was dark, it was fun, and the bulbs were the end of a mass bulb planting started earlier in the month and the newest addition to an already existing collection that puts on such a great show from mid April through the spring months....just another reason to take a stroll. For anyone interested, there will be a list included in the annual report.

And now for the most exciting news...the tree planting on October 26 and the first stage in THE BHS

COMMEMORATIVE PROJECT. For your strolling pleasure all year round we now have 4 trees planted in the park...all different and all strategically placed to give the park a more intimate atmosphere and encourage folks to sit, relax and smell the flowers. Planted by each of three benches along the inner sidewalk are an Ohio Buckeye, Aesculus glabara (yellow flowers in late Spring), a Maakia amurensis (creamy pealike flowers in Spring) and a Heptacodium 'Seven Sons' (white flowers in the Fall and then red seed pods). Highlighting the Brooklin Horticultural Society Garden sign is an already quite tall Robinia, 'Purple Rain' (a hybrid locust with



beautiful pale purple flowers). Within the next two weeks at opposite ends of the garden two larger shade trees, a heritage River Birch, Betula nigra and a Linden 'Greenspire' will be in place thanks to The Town of Whitby's tree man John Rousseau, his planting crew and to Jennifer Smith, Head of Operations who not only supports what we are doing but also paid for the six trees.

So stay tuned. We have big plans all leading to the Brooklin Horticultural Society's 100 Year Celebration. In the meantime, come visit the Brooklin Horticultural Society Garden Park and enjoy what is truly a community (of gardeners) endeavor.

BHS Commemorative Project

As a result of generous donations from past BHS members, a committee consisting of Sherry Howard, Faye Collins, **Jone Webster** and **Jane Austin** was formed to explore ways to utilize the monies. It was concluded that the funds be used to benefit not only BHS members but also the communities where our members live. What better way to recognize the contributions of past and present BHS members and all gardeners alike, than to buy and plant a living gardener's legacy. The team's first initiative can already be seen at the BHS Garden Park located at the corner of Carnwith Ave and Montgomery St. Thanks to Jennifer Smith, John Rousseau and their staff at the Town of Whitby, several trees have been planted. Many considerations were taken in choosing the trees, including floral and bark interest, fall colour, size, location, soil conditions and usage. The planted trees include: an Ohio Buckeye and a Maackia amurensis to provide shade for those sitting on the existing benches; a River Birch and a Heptacodium 'Seven Sons' in the southwest area; a black locust Robinia 'Purple Robe' by the BHS Park sign. A Linden tree donated by BHS member **Ken Love** will also be planted at the park.

This project will be ongoing with further plantings and initiatives planned for each year. The generosity of our donors will not go unnoticed as our gratitude will be acknowledged each year in the BHS yearbook.

Sofie's Spring Bulb Picks

Mason House Gardens in Uxbridge will be open until Christmas this year. Thursday to Sunday IOAM - 4PM to Dec 22. www.masonhousegardens.com Their spring bulbs are 40% off. They are priced individually so you can buy one or more - whatever you want. They started with 200 varieties - not sure what is left now. I purchased some unusual hyacinths - Isabel has green/purple double flowers, and Eros has pink/white double flowers. Check out the tulip called Ice Cream - looks like vanilla ice cream on a pink cone. Expensive but unusual - now at 40% off. You should try the giant alliums and the eremurus (common name foxtail lily). Both spectacular in the spring. We spray paint the spent allium heads in an unusual colour to extend the season by another 3 weeks or so. Eremurus need really good drainage and because they are very early to emerge, I place an inverted pot over the shoots to prevent frost damage, or mulch with leaves, or find a spot in the garden that stays cold the longest. They multiply each year for more and more blooms.

Recent General Meetings

Belinda Gallagher, our August speaker supports sustainale le urban gardening. She explained that many plants sold as native plants are not necessarily such. Cultivars of native plants (those with fancy names) are not native; neither are foreign plants that have naturalized in Canada. She believes in protecting native plant stands, but also encouraging ecological diversity.

In September, **John Statham** of John's Garden in Uxbridge introduced us to the evolution of his garden and his amazing and unusual collection of perennials, grasses, conifers, trees and orchids, as well as providing plant care It tips. Well worth a visit. Now open Sundays only.

Since a change is better than a rest, at the October meeting, Bella Seidan and Barbara Cooper took us visually to the West coast of South Africa to view the spring flowers and native animals. The arid conditions of much of this area support small unique succulents. We were shown interesting hyacinths, iris, calla lilies, locusts, proteas, and a clivia collection. Of course, a trip to South Africa is not complete without an animal safari or two. Bella and Barbara snapped many large animals in natural settings, as well as lizards, insects, and African penguins on the coast.

What's Next?

As winter comes to Southern Ontario and our gardens go into hibernation, so too does BHS. Our next general meeting after the November AGM will be on **Wednesday**, **February 26**, **2014**. In early February, current members will receive our next newsletter along with the 2014 membership form.
